### **1. Thomas Bach**

German lawyer and former Olympic gold medal-winning fencer. Elected President of the International Olympic Committee in 2013. Characterized by diplomatic skills, attention to protecting Olympic neutrality, and handling crises such as doping issues and controversies regarding Olympic bidding processes.

### **2. Nicole Hovertsz**

An Aruban former Olympic artistic swimmer and lawyer. IOC Vice-President, renowned for promoting gender equality and assistance towards the power of small nations in the Olympic movement.

### **3. John Coates**

An Australian lawyer with extensive experience in Olympic bids and host city contracts. Principal coordinator of the Sydney 2000 and Brisbane 2032 Olympics. Respected for legal expertise and attention to detail planning and contract compliance.

### **4. Ser Miang Ng**

A Singaporean businessman and diplomat. Past IOC Vice-President, with a focus on building Olympic youth engagement, fiscal accountability, and sport development in Southeast Asia.

### **5. Juan Antonio Samaranch Jr.**

Spanish entrepreneur and sport administrator. IOC Executive Board member. An integration of respect for Olympic heritage—partially as a result of being the offspring of an experienced IOC president—with promotion of sport modernization and innovation.



## **6. Kirsty Coventry**

Zimbabwe's most decorated Olympian, specializing in swimming. Serves as chair of the IOC Athletes' Commission, and advocates for athlete health, safety, and expanded roles for athletes in IOC decision-making.

## **7. HRH Prince Feisal Al Hussein**

A Jordanian royal and military officer with a strong drive for peace-building through sport. Promotes integrity in sport, youth empowerment, and inclusive policies for conflict zones and developing regions.

## **8. Lydia Nsekera**

A Burundian sport administrator and erstwhile president of her nation's football federation. One of the IOC's first African women. An advocate for women in sport, especially on the African continent.

## **9. Richard Carrión**

A Puerto Rican banker and former chair of the IOC's Finance Commission. An advocate for financial discipline, transparency in Olympic finances, and fair cost-sharing with host cities.

## **10. Prince Albert II of Monaco**

Olympic bobsledder-turned-reigning monarch of Monaco. A champion of Olympic environmental practices, sustainable event management, and the protection of the interests of small nations.

## **11. Morinari Watanabe**

A Japanese sports administrator and president of the International Gymnastics Federation. A supporter of youth-driven innovations in sport and managing new discipline additions.



## **12. Beatrice Allen**

A Gambian sports development, Olympic Solidarity, and social programs activist. Prioritizes equal access to Olympic means for less-resourced National Olympic Committees.

## **13. Nawal El Moutawakel**

A Moroccan Olympian and the first African female gold medalist. Pioneered opening doors for women and establishing a dialogue regarding culture, religion, and the role of the Olympic movement in the Islamic world.

## **14. Mikaela Cojuangco Jaworski**

Filipino Olympian equestrian and lawyer. Youth sports advocate, Youth Olympic Games supporter, and Asian voice advocate in the IOC.

## **15. Sir Craig Reedie**

British head of sport, retired World Anti-Doping Agency President (WADA), and IOC member. Known for his efforts on governance to make stronger world anti-doping rules.

## **16. Sarah Walker**

A New Zealand Olympic medal-winning BMX rider. As a member of the IOC Athletes' Commission, ensures athlete mental health and the addition of emerging sports.

## **17. Syed Shahid Ali**

A Pakistani businessman dedicated to speaking on behalf of South Asian National Olympic Committee member voices, ensuring equality and access for developing countries.



### **18. Sebastian Coe**

British double Olympic gold medalist in athletics and head of World Athletics. Engaged in controversies around the preservation of track & field's international heritage and anti-doping safeguards.

### **19. Astrid Uhrenholdt Jacobsen**

Norwegian cross-country skier and physician. Wholistic advocate for athlete welfare, with a medical and scientific understanding of sport health and protection.

### **20. Yelena Isinbayeva**

Russian Olympic pole vault champion and former world record holder. Interested in the promotion of clean sport policy and the integrity of competition in times of tension on the world stage.

### **21. Pau Gasol**

Spanish basketball Olympian and IOC Athletes' Commission member. Interested in athlete transition and education, and has a specific interest in social responsibility and youth.

### **22. Annamarie Phelps**

A British sports and rowing leader. President of European Rowing and environmentalist protector of water sports and athlete welfare protection in premier events.

### **23. Andrew Parsons**

President of the International Paralympic Committee, Brazil, dedicated to disability rights and to ensuring the integration of Paralympic values into Olympic systems.



#### **24. Witold Bańka**

A Polish sport administrator and the Head of the World Anti-Doping Agency. Strong advocate of robust anti-doping enforcement and global cooperation on sporting integrity.

#### **25. Gianni Infantino**

FIFA President, adopts a central but cooperative role on Olympic football and strives to maintain reciprocally advantageous relations with the Olympics and world football interests.

#### **26. Tony Estanguet**

French Olympic canoeist and Paris 2024 Organizing Committee Chair. Strong champion of a sustainable Olympic legacy and innovative collaboration with host cities.

#### **27. Casey Wasserman**

LA28 Organizing Committee Chair with a vision to drive inclusion, innovative application of technology, and budget-conscious Games planning.

#### **28. Hashimoto Seiko**

Japanese Olympic speed skater and politician. Former chair of the Tokyo 2020 Organizing Committee and event hosting ambassador in difficult times, like during the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### **29. Anita DeFrantz**

US Olympic medal-winning rower. First African American and first woman to have served as IOC vice president, celebrated for championing Olympic education, civil rights, and diversity.

#### **30. Tegla Loroupe**

Kenyan retired marathon world record holder who leads the Refugee Olympic Team initiative, advocating displaced athletes and humanitarian causes within the Olympic framework.



### **31. Maja Włoszczowska**

Polish cyclist and IOC Athletes' Commission member. Advocates quality anti-doping education and for adding new sports to the Olympic program.

### **32. Yuki Ota**

Japanese Olympic fencer. Advocating digital transparency, impartial judging, and technological innovation in sporting events.

### **33. Sam Ramsamy**

South African former IOC member and anti-apartheid campaigner, recognised for his success in sport as a force for social change, empowerment of youth and equity.

### **34. Prince Tunku Imran**

Malaysian sport administrator and advocate for the voices of Commonwealth nations in global sport. Is keen to highlight the role for greater representation and awareness among Olympic committees.

### **35. Gunilla Lindberg**

Swedish sports administrator, Association of National Olympic Committees Secretary General, prominent in negotiating national committee and Olympic interests relations.

### **36. Danka Barteková**

Slovak Olympic competition shooter and sports administrator. Busy advocating for athlete rights in the IOC and raising awareness about less prominent events.



### **37. Stefan Holm**

Swedish Olympic high jumper, IOC Athletes' Commission member. Firm supporter of mental health awareness and amateur sporting background.

### **38. Frankie Fredericks**

Namibian Olympic sprint medalist and sports campaigner. Stresses fair access for athletes from the developing world and ethical stewardship at all levels.

### **39. Valérie Fourneyron**

French doctor and former-Minister of Sports. Strong advocate on medical ethics, avoiding doping, and health protection at the multi-sport games.

### **40. Juan Antonio Samaranch (Jr.)**

Spanish IOC Executive Board member. Skilled mediator on tradition vs. innovation conflicts and supporter of financial sustainability and responsible budgeting.
